### **REPORT:**

During the period of August 1-September 13 2017, bookstore revenue increased \$8,300 over the same period last year.

#### Fall 2017 headcount breakdown:

- 116 sports students (35 percent);
- 104 non-sports students (31 percent);
- 19 dual-enrollment students (6 percent);
- 94 online students (28 percent)

Ullman Center was re-roofed this summer; will receive new siding this winter. Additionally, Gibson Hall was re-roofed; outdoor railings and parking lot lamp-post bases were painted and parking lines were painted in the dorm parking lot.

The Welding Lab received an electrical upgrade to better accommodate student learning and equipment usage.

This fall (2018), only two students left DCC, resulting in an occupancy decrease of 1.5 percent in the first two weeks. The average decrease nationwide is approximately seven percent. Ten students withdrew in the first two weeks of fall 2016.

DCC is working with an individual to develop a student success video for Dawson Community College. Andy went through a series of events in his life as he worked towards completing his degree. He has identified key steps that attributed to his success while completing college and wants to share his story. Stay tuned!

Dawson Community College has been part of the planning for the Eastern Montana Cooperative Impact week. Jane Wynne has taken the lead on this important initiative for us. Thanks, Jane, for your great work. The communities of Circle, Sidney and Baker are also involved with different businesses that are under the Cooperative structure. They will be at DCC on Monday and Tuesday, October 30 and 31.
