History Professor Preserves Haitian History

The British Library's Endangered Archives Programme has allocated funds to preserve a rare collection of Haitian newspapers thanks to a team of American and Haitian researchers including Montana Western professor, Dr. Erin Zavitz.

This grant will provide equipment and employees to digitize the historic newspapers, some of which are the only copies in the world.

Zavitz is currently working on a manuscript project entitled "Visions of Haiti's Past: Commemorations and Representations of the Haitian Revolution."

Psychology Student Assists with Government Research

Psychology Major and University of Montana Western junior Roberta Irvin interned at the University of Pennsylvania over the summer. She worked with the National Institute on Drug Abuse, aiding researchers in their studies on the transmission of HIV. The school was Irvin's first choice out of 30 sites across the country where NIDA employs student interns.

Irvin believes none of this would have been possible without Experience One.

In addition to the Keynote address, the Howard Gaines Service Award was presented to Julie Ingram for her outstanding work in the mental health field.

Ms. Ingram has helped patients in crisis for many years at Barrett Hospital and Healthcare.

Coach T.J. Nelson Headed into the NAIA Hall of Fame

Former University of Montana Western wrestling coach T.J. Nelson is heading to the NAIA Hall of Fame.

The National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) announced 21 honorees with the association's highest individual honors as part of its annual NAIA National Awards Day.

T.J. was the head wrestling coach at Montana Western from 1987-1996. During his tenure, T.J.'s teams finished in the top 5 nationally, including earning the National Championship in 1994. Coach Nelson will be honored during the NAIA championship in De Moines, Iowa in March 2018.

Firefighter Fitness Assessed by HHP Students

Assistant Professor Laura Young's Exercise Physiology class had the opportunity to test the health of the Dillon Volunteer Fire Department as their final assignment in Block 1.

The University of Montana Western's new Health and Human Performance (HHP) Lab is opening its doors to the campus and to the community. In the first weeks of the school year, Montana Western's HHP students have already utilized the new facility, becoming skilled in administering and supervising fitness test batteries and providing support during the annual fitness testing of the Dillon community's first responders, including the Dillon Volunteer Fire Department.

The firefighters were evaluated for upper body, core, and grip strength among other tests. They also had their blood pressure and body mass index (BMI) measured by the students as part of this experiential learning experience. Bulldogs Shine at Home Rodeo

The Montana Western Rodeo Team closed out the fall portion of their schedule with a strong performance at the Harry Andrus Arena Sep. 29-Oct. 1, 2017.

After two performances and a long day of slack, 31 Bulldogs found themselves in the short-go. The Bulldogs brought home three buckles and two allaround champions.

Both the Men's and the Women's finished second. The men maintained their third-place spot in the Big Sky Region standings, sitting 661 points behind second place Northwest College. The women stayed in second place, 318.5 points behind Montana State University.

History Student Researches Rural Schools

As a part of her senior project, Miranda Martinez created an oral history project based on interviewing teachers at rural schools. Their personal accounts helped shape the path she's on today.

Martinez wrote: "During each of my interviews I asked what seemed to be the biggest difference between urban and rural schools. The overwhelming answer was the connection that teachers and students had."
