## Professor Emeritus of Political Science: Louis D. Hayes; The University of Montana-Missoula

## **THAT**

Upon the occasion of the retirement of Professor Louis D. Hayes from the faculty of UM–Missoula, the faculty wishes to express its appreciation for his years of dedicated and valued service to the University, the Department of Political Science, and the State of Montana by recommending that the rank of Professor Emeritus be conferred upon him by the Board of Regents of the Montana University System.

## **EXPLANATION**

Louis D. Hayes received his B.A. degree in 1962 from the University of Colorado and his Ph.D. degree in 1966 from the University of Arizona. He served on the faculty of The University of Montana (UM) from 1968 until his retirement in 2011. During these 43 years he held the UM academic positions of Assistant Professor, tenured Associate Professor, and tenured Professor of Political Science and Director of the Bureau of Government Research.

In his teaching, Louis Hayes contributed his considerable knowledge in comparative government and international relations to several generations of UM students. Having prepared himself at Colorado as an Asian scholar, Hayes branched beyond that area and developed and offered new courses in the politics of the Middle East, the theories of civil violence, and comparative law. He was known and relied on locally and nationally as the Department's expert on Asian affairs. He was one of the first UM professors to organize and guide study-abroad trips to expand his students' learning opportunities.

Hayes' credibility as a teacher was enabled and enhanced by his acceptance and credibility as a scholar. His many books on Asian politics, several repeatedly revised and reissued as new editions, include *Politics in Pakistan* (Westview, 1984), *Japan and the Security of Asia* (Lexington, 2001), *Introduction to Japanese Politics* (Sharpe, 2008), and *Political Systems of East Asia: China, Korea, Japan* (Sharpe, 2008). His articles on Asian politics and international relations appeared regularly in such journals as *Social Science, Asian Survey, Journal of the Council of World Affairs, Journal of Asian and African Studies, Asian Thought and Society, The Social Science Journal, and <i>Politics and Economics of Asia*.

As a campus citizen, Hayes contributed significantly to the governance of the University. His many high-level service commitments included serving effectively and notably for many years on UM's Asian Studies Committee and occupying the leadership positions of chairman of the Department of Political Science, Chairman of the Graduate Council, and president of the Faculty Senate.

Recognition of Louis D. Hayes as Professor Emeritus is duly warranted given his long record of distinguished service at The University of Montana as a teacher, scholar, and citizen.
