## Alumnus Tony Schoonen Recognized for Conservation Efforts

Montana Western alumnus Tony Schoonen was recently inducted into the Montana Outdoor Hall of Fame.

During his tenure on the Montana State Legislature, Schoonen fought to protect streams and rivers from encroaching highways.

"The most important legislation that I was involved in was our long standing stream access proposal which Governor Schwinden signed into law in 1985," Schoonen said.

## Professor Steve Mock Teaches at Khumbu Climbing Center in Nepal

Montana Western Environmental Sciences professor, Steve Mock, is the director of the Khumbu Climbing Center (KCC), a project of the Alex Lowe Charitable Foundation, a non-profit organization based in Bozeman, Mont.

The center has become a successful vocational program for indigenous people and over 1,000 local men and women have completed the course.

Topics include technical climbing skills, English language, mountain safety, rescue, and wilderness first aid. The goal is to create a sustainable program that will eventually be completely operated by the local people.

## Student Receives Montana Athletes in Service Award

The Montana Campus Compact honored Montana Western sophomore Samantha Hubbard for her outstanding community service work at the 2017 Brawl of the Wild Football Game in Bozeman.

Along with cheerleading, Hubbard volunteers with the Beaverhead County Humane Society, the Montana Western Intramural program, and is a Sunday school teacher and worship leader at the Vineyard Christian Fellowship in Dillon, Mont.

Majoring in social sciences, she plans to pursue a law degree after graduating.

## The Block Schedule Helps Student Find his Passion at Montana Western

Wyatt Sarrazin is a member of the student senate and five different clubs along with working as a carpenter to build sets for the drama department.

## Author Ken Egan Explores the History of Montana's Statehood

The Montana Western "Dances with Words" event held on Nov. 13, 2017 featured executive director of Humanities Montana, author Ken Egan, reading several excerpts of historical non-fiction from his new book.

"Montana 1889: Indians, Cowboys and Miners in the Year of Statehood" chronicles major events from the eyes of prominent figures involved in Montana's journey to statehood.

The first passage Egan read regarded Canadian politician and 19th-century revolutionary, Louis Riel.

Egan emphasized that, "One of the worst things we do [when writing history] is convert historical figures into flat stereotypes. It's my hope that this book will help de-heroicize famous figures in the West."

## Mr. Bill Wilson Appointed to Athletic Director Position

## **Student Liz Hanson Examines the Validity of Horse Personality Questionnaires**

On her senior project, Hanson said, "It's a trend in the horse world. People put a lot of emphasis on horse personality when it might not be valid."

To test her theory, Hanson travelled to five different facilities in Montana. For 52 different horses, she asked the primary owner to fill out a questionnaire describing the horse's personality.

She then recorded video footage of the horse and had a group of experts rate their personality.

By comparing the two results, she hopes to scientifically measure the effectiveness of these questionnaires.

## **Scholarship Honors Memory of Colton Tanner Rohlf**

Montana Western Senior Delaney Hansen is the first recipient of the Colton Tanner Rohlf Memorial Scholarship. This scholarship honors the memory and life of Colton Rohlf.

"Colton has a permanent place in my heart, and I intend on carrying the memory of him with me as I continue my education and begin my career," Delaney said.

Colton's love for helping others wasn't limited to Montana Western, as he also performed many services in his hometown of Great Falls, Mont., including volunteering with the Special Olympics.

## **Author Caroline Patterson Reads at Dances with Words**

Patterson is an award-winning author and Executive Director of the Missoula Writing Collaborative.

She read from her new book, "Ballet at the Moose Lodge," a collection of 16 short stories that explore what it is to be a female in the American West.
