ITEM 178-2010-LI0218

Notification of the establishment of a Montana School Superintendent Certificate Proposal

THAT

The MSU Department of Education, Education Leadership proposes to establish a Montana School Superintendents Graduate Certificate. The Department of Education, Education Leadership Program has been providing coursework to license MT Superintendents for over 40 years. Our notification enacts a 15-credit certificate program to acknowledge superintendents' successful completion of the 12 credits of coursework and three credit field experience required for licensure. All courses proposed in the MT School Superintendent Certificate program are currently offered every summer through a blended format that takes advantage of online learning and a two-week intensive cohort experience on the MSU campus in June. There will be no change in the four courses (EDLD 620, EDLD 645, EDLD 650, and EDLD 655) that are already offered for superintendent licensure.

This intensive summer program provides an important option and creates additional access to practicing school leaders who typically work 50-60 hours/week and may not have the time to complete coursework during the MSU academic year.

EXPLANATION

The MT Superintendent Certification provides required content knowledge and clinical practice experiences for school leaders at the district superintendent level. Coursework is prescribed in the school accreditation standards of the Administrative Rules of Montana (ARM). Specifically, ARM 10.57.414 delineates the requirements for educator licensing of superintendent candidates. MSU's Education Leadership Program has been one of two Educator Preparation Providers in the state of Montana to offer Superintendent Licensure coursework for several decades. Providing the necessary content knowledge and training for superintendent candidates to enable them to ethically and effectively lead K-12 schools in Montana is consistent with MSU's Land Grant Mission. Typically, the MSU Education Leadership Program has 15-20 superintendent candidates complete coursework and field experiences to gain licensure each year. Acknowledging students' program completion through a formal certificate honors their efforts.

Secondly, codifying completion of this coursework as a certificate is to aid in MSU's Education Leadership's accreditation requirement to collect data on and track the success of program completers. During MSU's Teacher Education Program's CAEP accreditation process that culminated in 2016, external reviewers suggested that we formalize our Superintendent Program by offering a certificate of completion that would acknowledge actual program completion, and that could also be used to help us better track completers for the purpose of program improvement and future accreditation reviews.

Third, codifying completion of this coursework as a certificate is to provide superintendent licensure students with a credential signifying successful completion, that although not required for licensure in Montana at present, is required in many states in the region. The proposed MT School Superintendent Certificate will create employment opportunities for our students across the Mountain West region. Those opportunities will not be possible without a formal certificate delineating completion of our Superintendent Program.

Proposal Summary [360 words maximum]

What – The Montana School Superintendent Certificate is a graduate certificate program for post-master's students who complete the academic coursework required for Montana School Superintendent licensure. The required coursework comprises a total of 15 graduate credits including EDLD 620 The Superintendent, EDLD 645 Personnel Management and MT Collective Bargaining, EDLD 650 MT Finance and Facilities, and EDLD 655 MT Legal and Policy Studies. A three -credit field experience at the superintendent level is also required (EDLD 574).

Why – MSU has educated students for superintendent licensure for at least four decades. We seek to codify what we have historically been doing through a certificate of completion that recognizes the coursework, experiences and effort that students complete to gain licensure as a school superintendent. Although Montana does not require a formal degree or certificate for superintendent licensure, other states require students to "prove program completion" via a degree or formal certificate. It is our intent to provide MSU students with a formal certificate that honors their effort and program completion in order to broaden their employment opportunities in Montana and across the region.

Resources – No New Resources will be needed for this certificate program. Montana State University has provided students with coursework and experiences for superintendent licensure for at least four decades. The coursework for the proposed certificate is the same coursework that is offered every summer through a blended format to 15-20 Montana school leaders seeking to upgrade their principal licensure to gain superintendent endorsement and licensure.

Relationship to similar MUS programs – University of Montana also has a certificate program for School Superintendents. The UM program is typically offered during the fall and spring semesters through online coursework. The MSU proposal would allow students another option to take the coursework through an intensive summer program through a blended format that begins with online coursework and ends with a two-week face to face experience on the MSU campus during the last two weeks in June. This option is very advantageous for current school leaders (mostly principals) who are already working 50-60 hours/week. Completing 12 credits of coursework in an intensive 6-week format serves busy school administrators well.

UM BRIDGES trains graduate students in STEM disciplines to conduct cutting-edge research on complex food, energy, and water problems and prepares these students to succeed in a range of science and science-related jobs through an innovative, interdisciplinary program. It will be jointly housed in the W.A. Franke College of Forestry and Conservation and the Department of Geosciences in the College of Humanities & Sciences.

Why

The proposed certificate will:

- enable graduate students from a range of disciplines to gain expertise related to the water-energy-food nexus
- provide relevant skills-based training opportunities in computational, numeracy, and communication skills
- train students to be innovative, interdisciplinary thinkers prepared for a range of career paths
- synergize faculty expertise and course content from different units on campus
- cement UM as a leader in water-energy-food graduate education
- help recruit graduate students interested in the water-energy-food nexus to UM

Students take courses in the biological, physical, and policy sciences, and courses focused on skills relevant to understanding and managing water. The certificate culminates in a capstone experience that enables students to apply conceptual water knowledge to a project.

Why

The certificate will provide a pathway for students to package existing UM courses into a credential on water and water-relevant skills. It will demonstrate to prospective students the breadth and depth of water expertise at UM, so that it's clear the multiple options they have to study water here.

No new resources are required or requested. This certificate builds on existing courses.

Relationship to similar MUS programs

There are no MUS certificates specifically focused on water science and society. There is a water resources minor at MSU, but it is not interdisciplinary or focused on skills like the proposed water science and society certificate.

Why

We believe the Northern Rockies Outdoor Leadership Certificate addresses a need among our students for leadership skills in an outdoor setting. In a brief survey to approximately fifty undergraduate students from the Franke College of Forestry and Conservation, the Department of Health and Human Performance, and the Wilderness and Civilization program, 92% indicated some interest in the certificate program and 65% expressed that they are very interested in the certificate program. When students were asked to what extent there is a need for a certificate focused on leadership training, 67% indicated that is very much a need for the program. In addition, 93% of students recognized that leadership skills are critical for success in their future careers.

Resources

No resources are required for the certificate program outside of the administrative support that already exists in the Franke College of Forestry and Conservation.

Relationship to similar MUS programs

MSU Billings offers an Outdoor Leadership Bachelor of Science. This certificate is different in that it is a complement to any major or degree program. This certificate focuses on teaching leadership skills that can be applied to a variety of professional and academic contexts, not just the outdoors.

The graduate certificate in Health Sciences Education Leadership is specifically designed to meet the needs of Physical Therapy and Physical Therapy Assistant educators as they prepare to navigate the complexities of program quality, clarify and effectiveness in an increasingly challenging higher education environment. This 12-credit certificate will be completed through four courses in an interactive, online format provided through a self-support program in the School of Physical Therapy & Rehabilitation Science within the College of Health Professions & Biomedical Sciences.

Why

This program is needed to meet new requirements regarding educational principles and methods training as mandated by the Commission on Accreditation in Physical Therapy Education in element 4G describing the role and qualifications for the Directors of Physical Therapist Assistant (PTA) Programs. Specifically, the new requirement states PTA program directors must have experience in educational theory and methodology, instructional design, student evaluation and outcome assessment, including the equivalent of nine credits of coursework in educational foundations. CAPTE will begin enforcing the expectation for post-professional course work in 2018.

Resources

The HSEL certificate program is a self-supported program. UM resources needed for this program are limited only to those required to accept and admit students into the program as well as awarding the certificate.

Relationship to similar MUS programs

The educational content of this certificate program is specifically tailored to directors of Physical Therapy Assistant programs. Although UM and MSU currently offers an education specialist graduate certificate in educational leadership, those programs are designed primarily for those interested in leadership in senior leadership positions in K-12 settings (i.e., Superintendent) and require completion of a minimum of 30 hours of coursework. Proposal Summary [360 words maximum]

What: The proposed Plumber/Pipefitter program at MSU Northern trains students in all aspects of welding and provides a background in Plumbing that would allow additional training for potential students to work in a refinery, pipeline, or industrial complex. It would include extensive training in fabrication of welded specialty parts, along with training in proper support, working at heights, assembly of piping systems, and print reading for welding and construction.

Why: The Department of Labor & Industry projects that 60 % of the existing skilled trade's workforce are nearing retirement age. This program at MSU Northern will assist in filling that labor gap and provide a trained pool of workers to work on these industrial projects. This Plumber/Pipefitter option allows the Welding Certificate students to continue their education and earn an Associates of Applied Science Degree in Plumbing/Pipefitting. It also allows those same students additional training towards an additional degree in Plumbing Technology.

Resources: MSU Northern already has a strong Trades area of study. This new proposed option would require no additional lab or lecture areas nor would it require any additional full time faculty. Our Mission statement of "Providing Higher Education for Professional & Technical Careers through an institution dedicated to the teaching & the pursuit of knowledge" will be met by providing this new program in Northern's College of Technical Sciences. Northern has strong ties with Industry Partners that will continue to support existing programs and meet Industry needs. These Industry Partners have requested this program to meet the demand based on the current aging workforce.

Relationship to similar MUS programs: MSU Northern has the only Plumbing Technology Program in Montana's University System. The Welding Program is also an existing program. This proposed option combines both Plumbing & Welding into another Degree option that would give students additional career opportunities. There will be no duplication in the Montana University System.



January 18, 2018

Williams Plumbing, in Bozeman Montana, created the first independent pipefitter apprenticeship program in the state. The JATC has successfully offered this option for many years. Williams wholeheartedly approves this program because it allows additional new hires an opportunity to gain employment in a trade that will continue to grow.

According to The Department of Labor Statistics (December 2017), there were 32 registered Apprentices in the Welder/ Pipefitter field. The majority of these individuals were in the later years of their Apprenticeship programs. Projections indicate the demand for trade workers will continue to grow due to an aging workforce, future job site requirements, continued shortages of skilled workers, upgrades to our aging industrial complexes in our state, & and construction of the infrastructure of our nation.

What

This is a request for authorization to change the title of the Health and Human Performance (HHP) B.S. option "Community Health and Prevention Sciences" option to "Public and Community Health."

Why

The new title aligns with national trends, as many Community Health undergraduate programs have changed their name to Public Health. We believe the new title will also improve UM's ability to attract and recruit students to our undergraduate degree. The Community Health and Prevention Sciences (CHPS) undergraduate program in HHP has been an established UM program for over 25 years and a leader in increasing the acumen of the public and community health profession in Montana; we would like to build on this achievement by aligning with current language in the profession. Moreover, the title change is the first step in a series of steps to move towards a collaborative undergraduate program with UM's School of Public and Community Health Sciences (SPCHS). (This collaborative SPCHS and CHPS model currently exists at the graduate level with the newly established MPH in Community Health & Prevention Sciences degree).

Resources

The name change will not require additional resources beyond those already in place in the program. With minimal revision of current syllabi, we will be able to adjust and add needed public health competencies in current courses that will continue to prepare and expand the preparation of students to work as health educators in public health settings.

Relationship to similar MUS programs

No other undergraduate programs in Public Health exist in the MUS system. While UM offers an online "MPH Generalist" degree as well as a blended "MPH in Community Health & Prevention Sciences" degree, UM currently does not offer an undergraduate Public Health degree.

The Department of Mathematical Sciences proposes a retitling of the M.A. program in "Teaching Middle School Mathematics" (MATMSM) to "Teaching School Mathematics" (MATSM).

Why

The Department of Mathematical Sciences seeks to expand the appeal of this online M.A. degree from its current targeted audience of only middle school math teachers to a larger audience that includes both middle school and high school math teachers. There is increased demand for masters-level, all-online mathematics courses that are specifically tailored to the meet the needs of grades 5-12 mathematics teachers. This increase in demand is driven by several factors. Grades 5-12 mathematics teachers seek masters-level programs that will support their work as mathematics teachers. Grades 5-12 teachers seek to complete masters-level programs as a means of advancing on their negotiated salary schedule. Finally, high school teachers seek masters-level mathematics courses to meet the qualifications required to offer dual-enrollment courses.

Resources

As an extant program seeking a new title, this proposal does not require any new resources.

Relationship to similar MUS programs

The program is unique among the MUS system as an all-online masters-level mathematics degree aimed at supporting the special work of teaching mathematics in grades 5-12. The nearest equivalent is MSU's MSMME degree. Important distinctions exist. Whereas the MSMME targets HS teachers and takes a mathematical content-focused approach (i.e. requiring advanced courses in analysis, abstract algebra, statistics) the MATSM targets both middle and high school teachers and takes a mathematical process-focused approach (i.e. requiring courses that examine the foundations of probability, geometry, algebra and statistics from a problem solving perspective).

Request for authorization to retitle the Forensic Anthropology option in the Anthropology M.A. to Forensic and Biological Anthropology

THAT

The University of Montana requests authorization from the Montana Board of Regents to retitle the Forensic Anthropology option in the Anthropology Master of Arts to Forensic and Biological Anthropology.

EXPLANATION

Two factors prompt this request to retitle the option. First, at the nationwide level forensic anthropology programs are now emphasizing breadth, transcending the traditional compartmentalization to include related areas of biological anthropology, especially human variation, DNA studies, and bio archaeology. It has become widely recognized that forensic anthropology theory and practice relies on biological anthropology and that in order to be a good forensic anthropologist one needs training in these areas of biological anthropology as well. Our department has recognized this from the beginning and have required graduate seminars in human variation and bio archaeology from the inception of the option. Therefore, no curricular change is required, merely the retitling to reflect the current trend within the field. Second, the title "option in Forensic Anthropology" implies that the curriculum can only accommodate students with a narrow interest in forensic anthropology. In reality, this option can accommodate students with interests in areas of biological anthropology such as human variation, modern and ancient DNA studies, and bio archaeology.

What

The University of Montana requests to retitle the Forensic Anthropology option in the Anthropology master of arts to Forensic and Biological Anthropology.

Why

Two factors prompt this request to retitle the option. First, at the nationwide level forensic anthropology programs are now emphasizing breadth, transcending the traditional compartmentalization to include related areas of biological anthropology, especially human variation, DNA studies, and bioarchaeology. It has become widely recognized that forensic anthropology theory and practice relies on biological anthropology and that in order to be a good forensic anthropologist one needs training in these areas of biological anthropology as well. Our department has recognized this from the beginning and have required graduate seminars in human variation and bioarchaeology from the inception of the option. Therefore, no curricular change is required, merely the retitling to reflect the current trend within the field. Second, the title "option in Forensic Anthropology" implies that the curriculum can only accommodate students with a narrow interest in forensic anthropology. In reality, this option can accommodate students with interests in areas of biological anthropology such as human variation, modern and ancient DNA studies, and bioarchaeology.

The University of Montana also offers both a Teaching English as a Second Language teaching minor and a Teaching English as a Second Language certificate program. The teaching minor must accompany a teaching major and leads to licensure through the Phyllis J. Washington College of Education and Human Sciences. The certificate program optimally serves students who wish to teach abroad and, thus, do not require licensure through the state of Montana. Given that these two existing programs fulfill the needs of both licensure-seeking students and non-licensure-seeking students, the English major option in Teaching English as a Second Language is obsolete and should be placed into moratorium.

Proposal Summary [360 words maximum]

What City College Montana State University Billings will offer a 12-month Ultrasound Technology Certificate of Applied Science degree for licensed/certified health professionals. Online didactic and in-person laboratory portions of the program will be completed at City College. Clinical internships will be conducted at Billings Clinic, St. Vincent's Healthcare and other clinical sites. The program targets students in Montana, Wyoming, North and South Dakota. This program will not affect other existing MSU Billings programs.

Why Ultrasound is one of the chief imaging modalities used in medical facilities to diagnose and treat disease without ionizing radiation. Billings, MT is the medical hub for Montana, Wyoming, North Dakota and South Dakota; therefore, it is logical to establish the Ultrasound Technology CAS at City College. A core mission and theme of MSUB is to meet the changing needs of our students and employers within the region (e.g., Economic Community Enhancement/Enhancing the Community). City College has access to appropriate clinical facilities in Billings and has the necessary academic support, faculty expertise and equipment by which to offer this program.

Resources City College has acquired and installed all equipment necessary for the program. All necessary equipment was donated by local hospitals or has been purchased via Perkins Grant funding. Current equipment includes a GE LogicQ 9 ultrasound machine, a portable Sonosite US machine, five transducers, and nine US videos/books describing how to perform ABD, OB/GYN, and vascular ultrasound. Some funding will be needed for purchase of more videos and ultrasound reference textbooks to be housed in the City College library in the near future. Laboratory space availability at City College MSU Billings has been identified as Room 200 in the Health Science building. Classroom space will be scheduled depending on room availability.

Relationship to similar MUS programs The Ultrasound Technology Certificate of Applied Science to be offered by City College will be unique in the State of Montana.

<u>City College Montana State University Billings Certificate of Applied Science (CAS) in Ultrasound Technology Programs</u>

Ultrasound Technology, also known as diagnostic medical sonography (DMS), ultrasonography or ultrasound, is a rapidly growing, dynamic medical field. As part of the healthcare team, diagnostic medical sonographers perform ultrasound examinations utilizing specialized equipment to assist with patient care.

Skills required by a sonographer include the following:

- Detailed knowledge of anatomy and physiology.
- Understanding of various disease processes and medical conditions.
- Ability and knowledge to perform a wide variety of examinations.
- Knowledge and ability to properly use ultrasound equipment.
- Knowledge of ultrasound physics and imaging principles
- Work effectively as members of the healthcare team.
- Exhibit good communication and critical analysis skills.

Upon successful completion of the ultrasound program(s), graduates can be considered candidates for examination given by the American Registry of Diagnostic Medical Sonographers (ARDMS) and/or the American Registry of Radiologic Technologists (ARRT) S.

According to the Bureau of Labor Statistics, U.S. Department of Labor, employment of ultrasound technologists is projected to grow 24% from 2014-2024, faster than the average for all occupations. The number of ultrasound jobs in 2014 was 112,700 and this is expected to increase to 140,300 jobs by 2024. Healthcare demand for ultrasound technologists in Montana, Wyoming, North Dakota and South Dakota will be driven by the same factors that have driven increased demand for ultrasonographers nationwide.

The need for an ultrasound program in Billings, MT and the surrounding four state region is great.

Ultrasound is one of the chief imaging modalities that is used in clinics, obstetrician's offices, and hospitals of all sizes to diagnose and treat disease without the use of ionizing radiation. Because Billings MT is the medical hub for Montana, Wyoming, North Dakota and South Dakota, it is logical to establish the Ultrasound Program at City College Montana State University Billings. City College has the necessary academic support, faculty expertise and equipment by which to offer this program in a hybrid-learning format. *In addition, Billings Clinic and St. Vincent's Healthcare Radiology Directors both submitted a letter requesting the*

development of an ultrasound program and the rationale for their request. Those letters are contained in this document.

Graduates of the program(s) will gain practical, hands on education in ultrasound scanning techniques and will be exposed to the underlying physics of ultrasonography, enabling prospective students to successfully pass the American Registry of Diagnostic Medical Sonographers (ARDMS) and/or the American Registry of Radiologic Technologists (ARRT) Sonography (S) registry examinations, respectively, and gain successful employment in the field.

This program is a natural extension of the existing Radiologic Technology Program, and complements the existing Nursing, Paramedic and Graduate Athletic Training Program at City College Montana State University Billings. There also is interest from Rocky Mountain College for the Physician Assistant (PA) students to gain training and experience in ultrasonography via our program.

Students will be able to earn a Certificate of Applied Science in Ultrasound Technology, which is intended for working professionals. The certificate program does not contain any prerequisites.

Local and regional hospitals, clinics and health centers will benefit from a properly trained workforce in ultrasound technology. The dedication of City College to the development of a skilled workforce in healthcare and to provide an opportunity to meet a variety of career choices will be expanded and enhanced by the proposed Ultrasound Technology program. A core value of City College MSU Billings is to meet the changing needs of our student based on the demands of employment opportunities within the region. These proposed programs will provide opportunities for our graduates to seek employment in the ever-growing field of ultrasound technology.

There are not any ultrasound programs in Montana, so there will not be any direct competition with other programs in the state. There is an accredited ultrasound program at Laramie County Community College in Cheyenne, WY, which is 452 miles away, and at Southeast Technical Institute in Sioux Falls, SD, which is 660 miles away. There are not any ultrasound programs in North Dakota.

THAT

Request for authorization to establish a minor in Sustainability Studies to be housed by Liberal Studies in the College of Letters & Science. The minor is designed to encourage undergraduate students from any discipline to explore the three pillars of sustainability (economic, environmental, soci-cultural) beyond course work in their major. The minor will require a minimum of 21 credits, with credits coming from each of the three areas, with a least 9 credits unique to the minor. An interdisciplinary undergraduate Sustainability minor will enhance the value of undergraduate degrees by identifying students who have taken initiative to learn and experience the integration of economic, social, cultural, and environmental sustainability within their disciplines

EXPLANATION

The Sustainability Minor will allow students to further differentiate their degree and make them more attractive candidates to potential employers. Additionally, there are a variety of sustainability service learning projects available on the MSU campus and in the State of Montana community through which students will have an opportunity to analyze real-world sustainability challenges and implement solutions. Examples of service learning projects include but are not limited to campus sustainability videos created by undergraduate marketing students, optimization of recycling processes by industrial engineering students, commuter solutions projects by engineering students, energy conservation research projects as well as internships with the Office of Sustainability, the City of Bozeman and across the State of Montana. The minor will align with the institution's mission of engagement and outreach and to providing students with experience that prepares them for their careers.

The Sustainability Minor is designed to encourage undergraduate students from any discipline to explore the three pillars of sustainability (economic, environmental and social) beyond course work in their major. The minor will require a minimum of 21 credits, with credits coming from each of the three areas, with at least 9 credits unique to the minor. The student's major advisor must certify that the coursework is complete. The Sustainability Minor will be administered by the Liberal Studies Program to complement and expand upon its other interdisciplinary majors and minors, and specifically to complement and align with the Environmental Studies major. The Liberal Studies Program works across departments at Montana State University to promote and foster interdisciplinary studies. With support from Liberal Studies, MSU is positioned to prepare students to understand and address sustainability challenges. An interdisciplinary undergraduate Sustainability minor will enhance the value of undergraduate degrees by identifying students who have taken initiative to learn and experience the integration of economic, social and environmental sustainability within their disciplines. The Sustainability Minor is supported by the Institute on Ecosystems (IoE), College of Agriculture, College of Engineering, College of Education, Health and Human Development, College of Letters and Science, College of Arts & Architecture, the Jake Jabs College of Business and Entrepreneurship and the Office of Sustainability.

The Sustainability Minor fits well within the Liberal Studies Program and the Office of Sustainability. Courses from many departments and disciplines will qualify for the Minor, bringing those departments closer together in their efforts to promote interdisciplinary research related to sustainability.

There will be no changes required to existing programs, and this Minor will greatly enhance the offerings by Liberal Studies, and MSU more widely. Since 2008, the minor in Sustainability has been reviewed by different groups at MSU from the Campus Sustainability Advisory Council to ASMSU Sustainability Center, Office of Sustainability (reporting to Terry Leist) and the Institute on Ecosystems. In 2016 Dean Rae tasked the director of Liberal Studies to revise and resubmit the minor and the Intent to Plan was submitted to the MUS system. University of Montana responded and the plan was adjusted accordingly and resubmitted.

The Sustainability Minor responds to a need identified by students to have sustainability-related coursework recognized through an official Minor. The Minor will help structure the undergraduate experience, facilitate students' access to sustainability focused courses, and will provide motivation to explore questions of sustainability through multiple disciplines.

The Sustainability Minor will allow students to further differentiate their degree and make them more attractive candidates to potential employers. Sustainability is increasingly listed as an important factor in how students are choosing colleges and universities. Additionally, there are a variety of sustainability service learning projects available on the MSU campus and in the State of Montana through which students will have an opportunity to analyze real-world sustainability challenges and implement solutions. Examples of service learning projects include but are not limited to campus sustainability videos created by undergraduate marketing students, optimization of recycling processes by industrial engineering students, commuter solutions projects by engineering students, energy conservation research projects as well as internships with the Office of Sustainability, the City of Bozeman, and across the State of Montana. The need for this minor at MSU is also motivated by requests from students who are interested in packaging together a thematic thread of existing courses to allow them to better understand and address the many sustainability related needs of our society. The minor will be designed to support students who are already enrolled in majors or conducting work in areas such as environmental science, environmental engineering, various agriculture, land resources and business programs, health and human development majors, liberal studies—environmental studies majors, and opportunities available thru several of our research Centers and Institutes.

The Office of Sustainability and faculty members of the Campus Sustainability Advisory Council (CSAC) have received numerous requests from undergraduate students for a Sustainability Minor. Kristin Blackler, Director of the Office of Sustainability, estimates that she receives an average of five student requests for sustainability courses and programs per week. She has seen a doubling of student research projects focused on campus sustainability in the past year. Based on these requests, approximately 50-70 students are expected to enroll in the Minor when it is announced. At present, students have to navigate an overwhelming array of classes throughout every college on campus, the Sustainability Minor will allow advisors to help students plan and choose courses and provide students the opportunity to enhance their existing field of study.

This need is supported by the International Society of Sustainability Professionals (http://www.sustainabilityprofessionals.org/system/files/ISSP-Article1-final.pdf). They note that in 2009 25 percent of respondents to "MIT Sloan Management Review's sustainability survey of global corporate leaders" said they were increasing their commitment to sustainability. In the 2010 survey, the number climbed to 60 percent, and nearly 70 percent of respondents predicted that their organizations would step up investment in 2011.

Faculty and administrators at MSU and UM participated in a conference call on April 6, 2017 to discuss similarities between MSU's proposed Sustainability minor and the existing Climate Change Studies minor at UM. It was observed that the existing UM minor and the proposed MSU minor both strengthen existing academic programs at the respective institutions, support the missions of both institutions and add educational and outreach value to students at both institutions. Areas of overlap also were discussed. The administrators and faculty agreed to continue discussions during the detailed proposal preparation phase to coordinate cooperation in areas of overlap and to more fully explore opportunities for collaboration between the two campuses in this important area.

In addition, as a result of that conversation, **section 3 and 4** of the original intent to plan document were updated to reflect our conversation and the I2P was resubmitted. There is a long tradition of environmental research conducted by both UM and MSU. MSU recognizes and respects the fact that UM has demonstrated leadership in sustainability education and operations and affirm that we would welcome the opportunity to work with UM faculty as we move forward in developing this minor.

The Sustainability Minor responds to a need identified by students to have sustainability-related coursework recognized through an official Minor. The Minor will help structure the undergraduate experience, facilitate students' access to sustainability focused courses, and will provide motivation to explore questions of sustainability through multiple disciplines.

The minor will allow students to further differentiate their degree and make them more attractive candidates to potential employers. Additionally, there are a variety of sustainability service learning projects available on the MSU campus and in the state of Montana through which students will have an opportunity to analyze real-world sustainability challenges and implement solutions. As part of the Montana University System's (MUS) involvement in the National Association of System Heads *Taking Student Success to Scale: High Impact Practices* (NASH HQHIPS) GFC MSU is focused on creating learning communities supported by an 8-week schedule. The 8-Week Advantage has been designed using high quality, high impact practices focused upon increasing retention, on-time graduation and overall student success.

Additionally, the 8-Week Advantage incorporates elements of the Complete College America/Complete College Montana (CCA/CCM) initiative, and The Momentum Pathway Scale Project. Those elements include "game changers" such as co-requisite developmental education, critical path courses, 15 to 30 credits to finish a degree, meta-majors and proactive advising.

We want our students to enter with a clear **purpose**, have a **path** and **plan** to meet their educational goals. SCALING UP HIGH QUALITY HIGH IMPACT PRACTICES LEADING TO INCREASED RETENTION AND COMPLETION: 8-WEEK BLOCK SCHEULING

Our first time, full-time graduation rates cited (at this writing) by the Montana Office of the Commissioner of Higher Education (OCHE) are cited in the table below. We absolutely must do better.

Overview

As part of the Montana University System's (MUS) involvement in the National Association of System Heads *Taking Student Success* to Scale: High Impact Practices (NASH HQHIPS) initiative, we are converting to block scheduling, a high quality high impact model to support retention and completion. This brief overview outlines the basic premise of our college-wide foundational vision for success: **Every student will have a purpose, plan and path for on-time completion.**

Our NASH HQHIPs initiative is based upon an extremely successful 2016-2017 pilot where we formed small learning communities supported by an 8-week block schedule. Our current objective is to bring to full scale learning communities supported by the 8-week block schedule. Based upon results noted in our pilot, these variables support the our students' success:

- Fixed and predictable classroom meeting times allowing students (especially students juggling part-time jobs, families and school) to create workable schedules.
- A faster progression toward certificates and degrees with shorter, more focused blocks and less time off between blocks.
- Simplify the registration process by enrolling students once in a single, well-planned, coherent program.
- Form peer support and learning networks among students in the same program.
- Reduce the amount of time students must be in class by using online technology and allowing students to move on once they've demonstrated competency.
- Embed remediation into the regular college curriculum so students don't waste time before they start earning credits.
- Provide better information on every program's tuition, graduation rates, and job placement outcomes so that students can make more informed decisions at the front end.

Coupled with intensive advising and career coaching, block scheduling will promote the use of a variety of curricular and cocurricular HQHIPs such as:


- First year seminars and experiences
- Writing intensive courses
- Undergraduate resources
- Internships
- Capstone Courses and Projects

Conclusion

Complete College America has several "big ideas". One of those is, "Time is the enemy of college completion." We want our students to enter with a clear **purpose**, have a **path** and **plan** to meet their educational goals. Our 8-week block scheduling initiative differs from UM Western's Experience One (X-1) in that we are focused on a sense of community and supportive strategies allowing students to meet their educational goals and get out into the Montana workforce. Among those is allowing for late start and supporting students in need of remediation prior to entering college courses.

High-Impact Educational Practices

First-Year Seminars and Experiences

Many schools now build into the curriculum first-year seminars or other programs that bring small groups of students together with faculty or staff on a regular basis. The highest-quality first-year experiences place a strong emphasis on critical inquiry, frequent writing, information literacy, collaborative learning, and other skills that develop students' intellectual and practical competencies. First-year seminars can also involve students with cutting-edge questions in scholarship and with faculty members' own research

Common Intellectual Experiences

The older idea of a "core" curriculum has evolved into a variety of modern forms, such as a set of required common courses or a vertically organized general education program that includes advanced integrative studies and/or required participation in a learning community (see below). These programs often combine broad themes—e.g., technology and society, global interdependence—with a variety of curricular and cocurricular options for students.

Learning Communities

The key goals for learning communities are to encourage integration of learning across courses and to involve students with "big questions" that matter beyond the classroom. Students take two or more linked courses as a group and work closely with one another and with their professors. Many learning communities explore a common topic and/or common readings through the lenses of different disciplines. Some deliberately link "liberal arts" and "professional courses"; others feature service learning.

Writing-Intensive Courses

These courses emphasize writing at all levels of instruction and across the curriculum, including final-year projects. Students are encouraged to produce and revise various forms of writing for different audiences in different disciplines. The effectiveness of this repeated practice "across the curriculum" has led to parallel efforts in such areas as quantitative reasoning, oral communication, information literacy, and, on some campuses, ethical inquiry.

Collaborative Assignments and Projects

Collaborative learning combines two key goals: learning to work and solve problems in the company of others, and sharpening one's own understanding by listening seriously to the insights of others, especially those with different backgrounds and life experiences. Approaches range from study groups within a course, to team-based assignments and writing, to cooperative projects and research.

Undergraduate Research

Many colleges and universities are now providing research experiences for students in all disciplines. Undergraduate research, however, has been most prominently used in science disciplines. With strong support from the National Science Foundation and the research community, scientists are reshaping their courses to connect key concepts and questions with students' early and active involvement in systematic investigation and research. The goal is to involve students with actively contested questions, empirical observation, cutting-edge technologies, and the sense of excitement that comes from working to answer important questions.

Diversity/Global Learning

Many colleges and universities now emphasize courses and programs that help students explore cultures, life experiences, and worldviews different from their own. These studies—which may address U.S. diversity, world cultures, or both—often explore "difficult differences" such as racial, ethnic, and gender inequality, or continuing struggles around the globe for human rights, freedom, and power. Frequently, intercultural studies are augmented by experiential learning in the community and/or by study abroad.

ePortfolios

ePortfolios are the latest addition to AAC&U's list of high-impact educational practices, and higher education has developed a range of ways to implement them for teaching and learning, programmatic assessment, and career development. ePortfolios enable students to electronically collect their work over time, reflect upon their personal and academic growth, and then share selected items with others, such as professors, advisors, and potential employers. Because collection over time is a key element of the ePortfolio process, employing ePortfolios in collaboration with other high-impact practices provides opportunities for students to make connections between various educational experiences.

Service Learning, Community-Based Learning

In these programs, field-based "experiential learning" with community partners is an instructional strategy—and often a required part of the course. The idea is to give students direct experience with issues they are studying in the curriculum and with ongoing efforts to analyze and solve problems in the community. A key element in these programs is the opportunity students have to both *apply* what they are learning in real-world settings and *reflect* in a classroom setting on their service experiences. These programs model the idea that giving something back to the community is an important college outcome, and that working with community partners is good preparation for citizenship, work, and life.

Internships

Internships are another increasingly common form of experiential learning. The idea is to provide students with direct experience in a work setting—usually related to their career interests—and to give them the benefit of supervision and coaching from professionals in the field. If the internship is taken for course credit, students complete a project or paper that is approved by a faculty member.

Capstone Courses and Projects

Whether they're called "senior capstones" or some other name, these culminating experiences require students nearing the end of their college years to create a project of some sort that integrates and applies what they've learned. The project might be a research paper, a performance, a portfolio of "best work," or an exhibit of artwork. Capstones are offered both in departmental programs and, increasingly, in general education as well.
