NSF Grant to Establish Partnership at UMW for Micro-Credentialing Research

A National Science Foundation Convergence Accelerator award will position the University at Buffalo with partner institution Montana Western as national leaders in micro-credentialing research.

Micro-credentialing is a digital system used by universities, businesses and other organizations to recognize knowledge, skills, and accomplishments in ways that can be easily shared by recipients online.

Research will focus on the processes, procedures and resources necessary to implement micro-credentials. Educators will also study the best ways the "multi-stakeholder" design teams operate, then use this research to develop theory and operational findings on how micro-credentials can be designed to "ensure quality, sustainability and stakeholder acceptance."

UMW Professor Published in the Ukrainian Journal of Physics

Dr. Craig Zaspel of the UMW Environmental Sciences Department was recently featured in The Ukrainian Journal of Physics as lead author in an article about his collaborative work with a team of international researchers.

Titled "Magnetic Chiral Solutions Stabilized by Oersted Field at a Thin-Film Nanocontact with Electric Current," Zaspel started working on the project three

years ago. The article was published on Nov. 1, 2019, as part of a special edition related to magnetization dynamics.

The team will continue working on the project with the goal of the development of higher frequency nanoscale microwave generators based on magnetic solutions.

UMW 2020 Regents Teaching Scholars Announced

Montana Western professors, Dr. Bethany Blankenship and Dr. Rob Thomas, have been selected by the Office of the Commissioner of Higher Education (OCHE) as Regents Teaching Scholars. They will lead faculty learning communities during spring 2020.

To highlight the centrality of teaching excellence to student success, the Office of the Commissioner of Higher Education has launched the Regents Teaching Scholars, an annual program recognizing teachers who have made exemplary contributions to teaching and learning at Montana University System campuses.

The Regents Teaching Scholars program will recognize and support the advancement of teaching and learning to make early coursework, and general education in particular, exciting, engaging, relevant, and impactful for students. The theme for this year's program will focus on George Kuh's ten "High Impact Practices."

Montana Western Ranked Among the Best Online Teaching Degrees

The University of Montana Western was recently ranked among the top 50 "Best Online Teaching Degree Programs in the Country" by Study.com.

When choosing universities, Study.com looks at several data points from Department of Education data, including graduation rates and tuition costs. Other factors are also considered, including the types of support offered to online students.

They evaluated hundreds of schools that offer online teaching degrees for this list and selected the University of Montana Western based on the quality of academic and career resources for online students pursuing a teaching degree.

Montana Students Attend Newman Civic Fellows Conference

Adrianna Pittman from the University of Montana Western, Jerico Cummings from Montana State University, McKenna Savage from Montana Technological University, Julius Scott from Great Falls College MSU, and Daisy Ward from the University of Montana recently represented Montana at the national gathering of Newman Civic Fellows, hosted by the Edward M. Kennedy Institute for the U.S. Senate in Boston, MA.

Two Montana Western Professors Earn Title of Professor Emeritus

Dr. Delena Norris-Tull and Dr. Mark Krank were conferred upon by the Montana University System Board of Regents for the title of Professor Emeritus. Dr. Norris-Tull and Dr. Krank served Montana Western with dedication and valued service for many years.

Dr. Norris-Tull earned her Ph.D. at the University of Texas, and joined the Education Department at Montana Western in 2004 after serving at institutions across the country. She served as chair of the Department from 2009-2011 and Spring of 2016, and later served as co-chair during 2016-2017. In addition to serving on several committees at UMW, she was also named as the CASE/Carnegie Foundation 2010 Montana Professor of the Year. This award recognized Dr. Norris-Tull's exceptional contributions to the Education Department, Montana Western, the state of Montana, and beyond.

Dr. Mark Krank earned his Ph.D. in psychological foundations of learning at the University of Wyoming. Prior to his time at the University of Montana Western, Dr. Krank served as an elementary and middle school principal in Wyoming and acting superintendent and elementary principal at the Omaha Indian Reservation in Nebraska. Dr. Krank's greatest achievement at Montana Western was being in the forefront of bringing Experience One – one course at a time block scheduling to the campus. As a teacher, Dr. Krank challenged students with rigorous classes and required that they think critically and communicate as scholars.

Montana Western Appoints Matt Peterson as Assistant Athletic Director
